A. G. Spalding, Captain of the Chicago White Stockings, has just brough out a new store hook, which will meet with the unqualified endorsement of everybody who has ever undertaken to score a game of base ball. They are of various sizes, to meet the requirements both of the spectator who scores simply for his own satisfaction, and for official scorers of clubs. The novel and commending feature of the book is the manner in which each of the squares opposite the name of the player is utilized by a division which originated with Mr. Spalding Each of these squares is divided into five spaces by a diamond in its centre, from the points of which lines extend to each of the four sides of the square. Each of these spaces is designed for the use of the scorer according to marks and signs given in the book, by thus dividing the squares into spaces he scores without the liability to make mistakes. The League rules of scoring are printed in the book—N. Y. Clipper, April, 1877.




